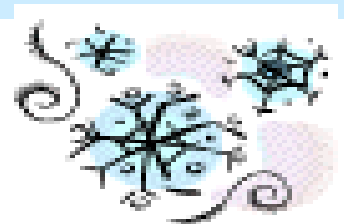

Reflections on the 2006 CCA Conference

The 2006 CCA Conference was a smashing success! It was held in September, at the Radisson Hotel and Conference Center, in Longmont. Over 150 students and counselors were in attendance and over 26 counselors signed up as new members. 25 workshops were offered on the day of the conference as well as pre-conference workshops.

This year four half-day pre-conference workshops were offered by the following divisions:

Colorado Association for Spiritual, Ethical, and Religious Values in Counseling

Colorado Association of Counselor Education and Supervision

Colorado Career Development Association

Colorado Licensed Professional Counselors Association



It appeared that these workshops were well received and based on attendance and participant comments, we plan to continue to offer pre-conference workshops. One of the benefits of these workshops is the longer three hour format so attendees can go into more depth on a given content area.

Another addition to the 2007 conference, was the therapeutic modalities. Five presentations were available including: Jungian Dream Interpretation, EMDR, Hypnotherapy, Sandtray Therapy and Gestalt Therapy. Attendees had time to attend three sessions. Once again, participant comments were very positive and it is our plan to include therapeutic modalities in the 2008 conference.

There were also some comments that indicated a preference for more networking time, especially over lunch. It is very difficult to meet everyone's desires in a very short period of time, But in light of the fact that counselors have so few opportunities to network with other counselor's it does seem like this might be an important issue to consider in future conferences.

The key note speaker; Dr. Patricia Arrendondo gave a very inspirational speech mid-morning. She not only spoke about diversity as a counseling professional, but out of her own experiences as a counselor. Dr. Arrendondo's talk was a reminder of the belief that the best learning occurs when experience follows knowledge. In Dr. Arrendondo's words, "This becomes learning that "sticks".

A final observation is how very fortunate CCA is to have had two past presidents of ACA as our keynote speakers for the last two years. Preceding Dr. Arrendondo was Sam Gladding who spoke at the 2005 conference. Both of these ACA presidents not only brought inspiring messages, but provided excellent leadership to ACA. We are once again very fortunate to have an ACA president as our key note speaker in 2008. Marie Wakefield, who will finish her term in June, will be our keynote speaker for this years conference in September. She is a dynamic speaker and has poured herself into ACA over a number of years, but especially this year as president. Because of these outstanding leaders, the past few years with the ACA have been very exciting and productive overall!

- * Creating an action plan of specific steps to anchor callings in your life
- * Gaining a renewed sense of direction and possibilities

News of Note from CLPCA

The 109th Congress passed legislation explicitly recognizing licensed professional counselors as health care providers with the VA health care system. This will allow the VA to hire counselors for mental health professional positions at the same pay grade as clinical social workers and to apply for supervisory positions open to clinical social workers and other mental health professionals. The bill awaits President Bush's signature to become law. The American Counseling Association and the American Mental Health Counselors Association worked hard and for years for this legislation. This is extremely important for us as Licensed Professional Counselors.

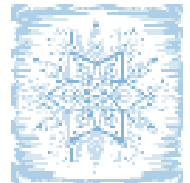

Perspectives in Peer Programs Call For Manuscripts

Perspectives in Peer Programs (PPP), a peer refereed journal, invites original manuscripts related to peer helping, including peer assisted learning, tutoring, mediation, listening, mentoring, leadership, and ministry. The *PPP* is published by the National Association of Peer Programs (NAPP).

MANUSCRIPTS ARE ACCEPTED FOR THE FOLLOWING SECTIONS

- **Speak out** – These articles provide an opinioned statement/position regarding specific or general aspects of peer helping.
- **Features** - These articles are theoretical, philosophical, or research oriented. Manuscripts should contain implications or practical applications for peer helper programs and training.
- **In the Field** - These articles focus on practical strategies for peer helpers in the field.
- **Perspectives** - These short essays present/describe (without expressing an opinion) an experience of relevance to others involved in peer helping.
- **Media Reviews** - These reviews are of current books and other resources (e.g., software, newsletters, etc.) that are of interest to those involved in peer helping.
- **Columns** - Consider submitting a column about Ethics and Standards, Research Abstracts, Peer Helping and Technology, Resource Reviews, or Trainer's Corner.

SUBMITTING YOUR PRELIMINARY MANUSCRIPT

- Do not submit material under consideration by another periodical.
- Manuscript style and format must conform to the guidelines in the latest edition of the *Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association*.
- Double-space all material, including references.
- Place the article's title on a separate page accompanying the manuscript. Include the author(s) name(s), contact information, and institutional affiliations).
- On a separate page, include an abstract of no more than 75 words. Place the article title at the top of the page.
- When applicable, reference should be made to the National Association of Peer Programs *Programmatic Standards* (<http://www.peerprograms.org/publications/publications/standards/>).
- Because manuscripts ordinarily are sent out for a blind, peer review, two or three months may elapse between acknowledgement of receipt of a manuscript and notification of its disposition.
- Email the package to krhall@vcu.edu as a Word document.

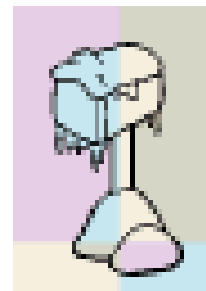
PREPARING THE FINAL VERSION

When an article is accepted for publication, the editor will send the author's) editorial comments. Completing final edits and agreeing to have the manuscript published in *PPP* signifies the author's) release of copyright. Please note that for publication authors) must:

- Secure written permission's) from the copyright holder for reproducing lengthy quotations and for reprinting and/or adapting tables and figures. The author must provide the journal editor a copy of the copyright holder's written permissions).
- Place each table and figure on a separate page following the reference section. Final placement of tables and figures is at the discretion of the production editor. Type font should be no smaller than 9 point.
- Provide the final version in Microsoft Word.
- Supply figures (graphs, illustrations, line drawings) as camera-ready art (laser or glossy print or velox) via email in separate TIFF or EPS files.

"Techniques to Share:" Another Publishing Venue

I want to remind you of another publication venue for you and/or your students. I'm the editor of the "Techniques to Share" section of THE FAMILY JOURNAL: Counseling and Therapy for Couples and Families. Below is a brief description and submission guidelines. I hope you and your students will consider submitting a technique manuscript for the section.

IF YOU WOULD PREFER TO RECEIVE THIS MESSAGE IN A LETTER VIA EMAIL ATTACHMENT, PLEASE FEEL INVITED TO SEND ME YOUR EMAIL ADDRESS AND I WILL SEND IT TO YOU.

The "Techniques to Share" section is dedicated to those practitioners who (1) have tapped into their own creativity to develop new or adapt existing techniques, (2) experienced these techniques as effective in their work with couples and families, and (3) are willing to share these techniques with marriage and family counseling colleagues. Below are guidelines specifically for prospective "Techniques to Share" section authors.

Guidelines for Prospective "Techniques to Share" Authors:

1. Begin the manuscript with an introduction to the technique/procedure that includes a theoretical rationale. In addition, include any available direct or derivative research supporting the use of the technique/procedure.
2. Provide a detailed description of the technique/procedure. Be specific and clear enough that readers will understand how to implement the technique/procedure with clients.
3. Following the description of the technique/procedure, provide a case study demonstrating the use of the technique/procedure.
4. Provide a short conclusion.
5. In addition to the above, please attend to the "Guidelines for authors" presented on the back, inside cover of each issue of THE FAMILY JOURNAL: Counseling and Therapy for Couples and Families.

- Political Action Committee

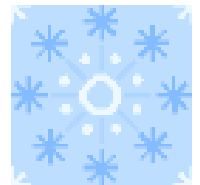


The following position of HB1080 was approved by the board: "CCA supports the part of the HB1080 affecting TITLE protection for art therapists if applicants meet the acknowledged requirements for art therapists." A second motion approved was that "CCA be on record as opposing any portion of the HB1080 allowing art therapists to be eligible for licensure as professional counselors merely by virtue of meeting requirements as art therapists."
